“WANTED”:

Five or six members (or more) who are willing to volunteer to form our own Honor Guard. We know you know all about never volunteering for anything, but this is different. As a minimum we need two Color bearers (and if we can find an Army flag, we'll need three), two guards, and a Color Commander (no, we don't need road guards). Everyone will need to be able to march in step. The Color bearers will carry the American Flag, the guideon, and if we get one, the Army flag. You will need to know, or be willing to learn, the protocol for marching with a flag and posting and retiring the Colors. We are not sure about finding weapons, but if we do the weapons bearers will need to remember a couple of the manual of arms movements; if no weapons, all you'll need to do is render the hand salute. The Color Commander will need to be able to call cadence and give the necessary commands. Everyone of our members can do this, we just need you to volunteer. 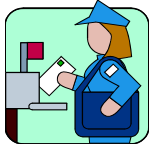

Reading the article about Ike's visit to Okinawa back in the 50s brought back some memories for me as well. I had the privilege of being picked as one of the Honor Guard members for Ike.

Those of you who were there at the time will remember that a call went out all over the island for volunteers to serve in the Honor Guard. You had to be a certain height, waist size, etc. I fit the picture and thought it would be an OK thing to be an Honor Guard member for the President of the United States. As it turned out, I was selected and we spent a lot of time doing close order drill, facing movements, manual of arms, etc—all the things we learned in boot camp—but hadn't done for a while.

I remember that in addition to the spit and polish, we could not have anything in our pockets, except an ID card in the left breast pocket. But the strangest thing was we could not wear a belt & buckle (could be used as a weapon I guess). So, no gig line of smudged brass belt buckle to worry about.

Because of our relative isolation I don't know too much about Ike's trip to Naha where troops lined the entire route, but I have read and heard some stories.

I had not thought of that incident in years until the story in the last Typhoon, so thanks for the reminder.

I was hoping to be writing about our reservation, but I have sad news.

First Mike attended G.I.'s (memorial) service in Jan. 07. Mike and G.I. had been special friends. George Irving Smith, Born Los Angeles, CA Nov. 21, 1937; Died Dec. 24, 2006. Married May 14, 1960 to Judy

for 46 years. Children: Susan, Julie, Michael and Karen. Served in the U.S. Army for 3 years 1956-59. Served as a Los Angeles County Sheriff's Deputy for 31 years.

Next of course is Mike. Enclosed is the information.

Michael A. Maki was born March 1, 1937 to Jack and Oretta Maki in Astoria, OR. His mom said he was born without much hair, long fingers and was just perfect. Early elementary education was spent in Seattle, WA during WWII. His family moved to Seaside and helped form Our Saviors Lutheran Church that met in the Strand Theater on Broadway. His two brothers and he made up the entire first Sunday school class. At Seaside High School, Mike was a letterman in football, basketball and track. He worked before school each morning at Harrison's Bakery. Mike graduated in 1955.

He went to Pacific University for a short time, where he was recruited into the Army for his high IQ; and became one of the first cryptologists with what is now the National Security Agency. He rose quickly through the ranks and was accommodated for his assistance with ending the Korean War and the escape of the Dahli Lama out of Tibet. Mike returned home to continue his studies as a history major and play football and basketball for Southern Oregon State College.

Mike moved back to Seattle to work for Streim Insurance Agency which quickly became Maki Insurance. He joined Rotary International, the Jaycees and became active with the Miss Oregon Scholarship Pageant. Mike volunteered for 30 years, serving periods as the Executive Director of Miss Oregon and the President of the National Association of Miss America State Pageants.

While in Seaside, Mike co-founded Serenity by the Sea. He spent his time loving the kids of Seaside. As an avid sports booster, he co-founded Seaside Basketball Tournament of Champions. He was the "dad advisor" of Seaside DeMolay and a member of the Masonic Ever-

green Lodge #137 AF & AM. Mike retired to Portland, OR and began Epic International.

Mike's time and devotion were given to his family, reading, golf, theater, entertainment, travel, and movies. He is survived by his beloved wife, Helen; daughter, Kimberly and husband, Steve Herder; sons, Neal and wife Teresa Maki; Michael Maki II, Terry and wife Melanie Bassett; brothers, Bob and Dennis Maki; and nephew, Brian. He delighted in his grandchildren, Daniel, David, Sarah, Nikole, Violet, Jane, Sophia, Ashley, Jake and Jackson.

Please send me the Torri Typhoon. I was looking forward to our Sept Reunion trip and visiting with friends.

Some of you have already seen this, but here's Bill Dowd's obituary sent by one of his friends.

William C. (Bill) Dowd, 79, Pleasant Hill, MO, was born March 8, 1928 in Philadelphia, PA, the son of Lawrence and Mary (Firth) Dowd. He passed away Wednesday, May 2, 2007, at Research Medical Center, Kansas City. Bill enlisted in the Army in July 1948. After training in radio school he spent most of his tour in Okinawa. Following discharge in 1952, he was employed by the CIA in January 1954. During his career with the CIA he was assigned to Nicotia, Cyprus; Panama City, Panama; Saigon, Vietnam; Rangoon, Burma; Khartoum, Sudan; Lagos, Nigeria and back to Saigon in 1973. He married Shirley, who was also an employee of the CIA, on May 14, 1965; she then accompanied him on the latter 5 overseas assignments. He retired from the

CIA in July 1975 and settled in Lee's Summit, MO, where he and Shirley raised horses. In 1984, they bought a farm in southeastern Jackson County and raised Angus cattle until 2002, after which the property was rented. Bill and Shirley moved to Pleasant Hill in 2005. He is survived by his wife Shirley of the home; 2 daughters, Deborah Canuso, of Philadelphia, PA; and Kathleen Hughes of Horsham, PA; a sister Mary Gounder, of Mohnton, PA; and 1 granddaughter.
