2004 REUNION WAS A GREAT ONE!

The 2004 ASA Okinawa reunion, held 30 September— 03 October is now history. By all accounts it was one of the better reunions. The Radisson Hotel North, Colorado Springs, Colorado served as the host hotel. The four day-three night event was attended by 79 men and 66 spouses or guests.

While the reunion did not “officially” begin until Thursday September 30th, some people arrived as early as Tuesday and a lot more on Wednesday. With so many people arriving early, an “early-bird” registration began on Wednesday afternoon to accommo-

date them. Because there was so much to do and see in the Colorado Springs area, an optional trip to the famous old west town of Cripple Creek was offered, and 60 persons made the trip. Rumor has it that some people won a few dollars at the gaming machines. The scenery between the Radisson and Cripple can only be described as “magnificent.” The ride was worth the price.

Although Thursday marked the first full day of the reunion, it was necessary to schedule a tour to accommodate the many survey responses request-

ing such a variety of activities. Consequently, an optional tour to The Air Force Academy and Garden of the Gods was made available. An unbelievable 84 people enjoyed a relaxed, hassle-free tour to the 18,000 acre Air Force Academy. After passing through the North Gate we viewed Diamond Lil, the B52 Bomber. The scenic overlook off North Gate Road was magnificent. A real treat was in store when the exquisite 17 spired interdenominational chapel was visited. Other attractions today included Falcon Stadium, the Cadet

Glider Port and the new 3.8 million dollar visitor's center. From the Academy, it was off to the Garden of Gods. Not surprisingly, this is the most photographed place in the United States. One of the world's greatest natural wonders, this gallery of amazing red rock sculptures was created years ago by violent geological forces. Fantastic formations jut skyward over 300 feet. Several stops were made to view such spectacular monoliths as Balanced Rock and Kissing Camels. Lunch at the Trading Post was included.

For those remaining in the hotel and those arriving, it was the excitement of seeing old friends and waiting to see who would be the next to walk through the doors. The hospitality room was open for those in the hotel. It was a real madhouse for a few minutes after the tour returned to the hotel. Those returning from the tour wanted to know who had arrived since they left and those arriving wanted to know who had been on the tour. It was great! The first planned function was the welcome reception at 1700 hours. Here Association President Billy "Tex" Davenport welcomed everyone and asked for the first time attendees to introduce themselves. Following Tex's remarks, the cash bar opened and hors d'oeuvres were served. The remainder of the evening was spent getting reacquainted and making new friends.

Friday started with an early breakfast for everyone going on the Royal Gorge trip. It was necessary to leave early so as to arrive in Cañon City in time to catch the 9:00 a.m. Royal Gorge Route Railroad. This spectacular, scenic train route traveled along the bottom of the Royal Gorge Canyon, with open-air cars as well as comfortable, climate-controlled coaches, and a small snack bar. The train stopped below the bridge and park for picture-taking. Here we disembarked and took the world's steepest Incline Railway up the towering walls of granite to the park to the world's

highest suspension bridge at 1,053 feet high (331 meters). It crosses the massive granite Royal Gorge as well as the raging Arkansas River. For anyone not feeling like walking across the bridge, the world's longest single-span Aerial Tram, which glides above the granite canyon and the Arkansas River, was available. The views of the bridge and surrounding Sangre De Cristo Mountains are breathtaking. Lunch was provided on the tour.

Once again, back in the hotel, people continued to arrive and when the tour returned, it was Thursday's mad house all over again. Friday afternoon there was a stag call, where all the men assembled for a leisurely discussion of world problems while enjoying the companionship forged many years ago. At 6:00 or thereabouts, the women, who could no longer contain their curiosity about the subjects being discussed, joined the men for a social hour and made ready for a Western-themed BBQ dinner. The evening was topped off with a C & W band playing a lot of familiar old country songs. Just for grins, so we can all say we've been kicked out of better places, we had to ask the band to leave early because so many other guests were complaining about the noise.

Suddenly, it was Saturday and the trip to Pikes Peak was here. Pikes Peak is America's Mountain, the best known peak in the country. This isn't because it's the highest, but because it rears out of the plains apart and alone. Discovered by Zebulon Pike in 1806, it rises 14,110 feet above sea level. As we traveled up the mountainside aboard a Swiss-made COG railroad system, we experienced three distinct geographical regions marked by striking changes. The summit was like being on top of the world. Those sweaters or jackets reluctantly dragged along were needed up top.

The annual business meeting was held at 3:00 PM. Branson, MO was reaffirmed as the reunion site for 2005 and Harrisburg, PA was

chosen as the 2006 site.

The annual raffle was conducted immediately after the business meeting. Many people brought items representing their home towns or states and lots of folks went away happy.

The banquet was of course the highlight of the reunion. There was music for dancing and listening pleasure after the meal. And we did have an Honor Guard from Ft Carson to post and retire the National Colors. Of particular interest is the fact the Honor Guard was from the 104th MI Battalion. The 104th traces its history back to one of the old ASA Battalions. This is significant because one of our members, Colonel (Ret) Bill Roscher, commanded this same battalion when ASA was still in business.

Then it was Sunday and nearly time to go. The farewell breakfast was a bit more somber than usual. The memorial service paid tribute to our deceased friends. All too soon it was time to go. Then the good-byes began. We've passed the handshaking stage, now its hugs. Then the room was empty.



BUSINESS MEETING ACTIONS; SOME CHANGES ARE FORTHCOMING; BE AWARE

This is not the official version of the business meeting, however, we believe the following accurately reflects the decisions made at the meeting that will have the most impact on the entire membership.

Most important has to do with the newsletter. It was unanimously agreed that the Torii Typhoon is an essential part of the association's ability to communicate with the membership. Members are encouraged to submit their stories, ideas, suggestions, criticisms and the like for publication. Publication cost is a major concern and at last year's meeting, ways to reduce the cost were discussed. At that time consideration was given to sending the newsletter only to dues paying members or those who contribute to the newsletter fund. Implementing this policy was postponed for a year to see if membership increased. It did not.

This year, a vote to stop sending the newsletter to non-members or non-contributors was reaffirmed and the newsletter editor and treasurer were directed to take the following actions. This issue of the Torii Typhoon will be sent to every person on the current mailing list. **Future issues of the Typhoon will be**

sent only to dues paying members or anyone not joining the Association, but contributing at least \$5.00 to the newsletter fund. It simply is not fair for less than 100 persons (the number currently contributing to the newsletter fund, plus the proceeds from the auction) to subsidize newsletters for the entire 1,500 plus mailing list. This will have no, repeat, no impact on the reunion registration information. **Everyone on the mailing list will continue to receive the reunion information.**

Here is how it will work. Dues are \$10.00 per year. Members have full voting privileges and are allowed to bring business before the assembly. All memberships will expire on December 31st. To be very clear on this, if you pay dues anytime during a calendar year – whether it is January 1st or November 30th, your membership will expire on December 31st of that same year. You may pay your dues for the following year (or years) at the annual reunion. For example, if you paid dues at this past reunion it was for the year 2005. If you pay at next year's reunion that will be for 2006. The mailing labels on the newsletter will now reflect your expiration date. Watch for it.

If for any reason you do not want to join the association, you may contribute at least \$5.00 annually to the newsletter fund and continue to receive the Typhoon. Your expiration date will also be reflected on the label. Contributors may not attend the business meetings and will not be permitted to vote or bring business to the floor.

People who served in the unit from all years are encouraged to join the association. Everyone, members, non-members and contributors are all invited and encouraged to attend our reunions.

All dues and contributions are to be sent to Tom Sturgeon – not to the newsletter. Tom will in turn provide the editor with a listing of expiration dates.

If you did not pay your dues or did not attend the last reunion, or if

Hi,

The activities at Sobe Camp went on for quite some time, starting in about 1948 when the operation was at Futenma in quanset huts. The original four buildings were built and occupied in 1953.

The reunions we have had to date, have been mostly attended by those troops who were there in the early times. My tour was June '55 to Oct. '57.

The natural transition of the Sobe Camp reunions will certainly

expand to include those who were at the JPC, too.

The reunions are organized by a professional organizer, who, by coincidence, was at Sobe Camp from 1957 to 1959 and went on to stay in the Army.

You perhaps are not familiar with the term "Sobe Camp." It was the early name for the station, certainly having its origin in Kadena Circle. The folks at NSA somehow didn't think that name was flattering enough and sponsored a contest for the renaming of the station. In early 1958 a guy in a motor pool won the contest with the name "Torri Station," which has stuck to this date.

PREVIEW OF BRANSON, MISSOURI FOR 2005 REUNION

Branson, MO, site of the 2005 ASA Okinawa reunion, has a lot to offer. The top attractions continue to be the 60 plus shows to choose from. You can find any type show you're looking for—from The Bald Knobbers "pure country" to the more sophisticated Shoji Tabuchi. Most of the "major" artists who once had their own showplaces are gone from Branson, but quality entertainment is still available. The Radisson Hotel (host for the reunion) sits beside one of the better theaters in Branson. It is not affiliated with any artist, but a major name star is always playing there. There is more than just the shows in Branson, and this is where we need your help. Below is a short description of some of the major attractions in Branson. We want to know what you want to do. Please take a few minutes to complete and return this survey because the entire reunion agenda will be created from your responses. If need be, we'll schedule a trip or show a day early like was done in Colorado Springs.

SHOWS:

Shoji Tabuchi: A family show with a touch of class; the bathrooms are a major attraction.

Dolly Parton's Dixie Stampede: Dinner and show featuring a rivalry between the North and South with spectacular horsemanship.

Andy Williams: Andy sings "Moon River" and other great hits from the past. Sometimes Ann-Margaret is on the show.

Mickey Gilley: Thirty-nine songs on the charts, 17 number one country hits. Not always in town.

Jim Stafford: A show filled with songs, laughter, and guitar picking. Voted 2004's entertainer of the year in Branson

Pam Tillis: Mel's daughter, a star in her own right with many top country songs.

Yakov Smirnoff: If you like laughter, this is the show. Voted comedian of the year for two straight years.

Some Options to consider:

- Non- discounted shows range in price from around \$25.00 to \$47.50
- Going as a group will get discounted tickets, not more than 10%
- There may not be enough tickets available for a single group show, so tickets would be on a first come basis.
- There may not be any tickets available for individual shows.
- When you buy a group ticket, you do just that. Tickets must be paid for well in advance, and there are no refunds, period. If you have to cancel, we will try to resell your seats internally, but if we can't, you're stuck with a show ticket.
- You can choose your own show and the time you want to attend. There are shows from breakfast throughout the day.
- You also have to get to the shows on your own either by car or walking. Parking is limited, and everything is up hill or down hill in Branson.

OTHER ATTRACTIONS:

Branson's Veterans Museum:

The Veterans Memorial Museum is composed of ten great halls covering the wars and conflicts fought during the 20th Century. A real tribute to veterans.

Ride the Ducks:

World War II Amphibious vehicles that run on land or sea. 80 minutes

of entertainment as you tour Branson. See famous Country Music Boulevard, Shepherd of the Hills Fish Hatchery, Table Rock Lake and Powerhouse and a spectacular scenic view from the top of Baird Mountain. Then splash into Table Rock Lake for a relaxing cruise.

Branson Belle Showboat:

Take a luncheon or dinner cruise on the Belle, Branson's grandest lake attraction, and enjoy the scenery, food and entertainment.

Branson Scenic Railway:

Take a 40-mile round trip through the Ozark foothills and tunnels. Learn the history of the area and enjoy the scenery, all with the luxury of rail travel from yesteryear.

Silver Dollar City:

At this amusement park you'll see the Ozarks at the turn of the century with traditional food, costumes, music, crafts and hair-raising rides.

Shopping at Tanger Outlet Center:

Do some shopping while in Branson at the Tanger Outlet Center. There is something for everyone in the 66 stores in the complex.

A few other items to consider when coming to Branson. The nearest airport is Springfield, MO. There is no complimentary shuttle service to or from the airport. Commercial shuttle service is available at the terminal. If there are enough people who fly – and you are willing to wait in the terminal, perhaps for a couple of hours, we will consider hiring a van or bus to pick you up as a group and returning you to the terminal on Sunday. No promises here, it depends on how many would be interested. Please check on the survey whether or not you would be interested in this option.
