2005 REUNION IN BRANSON WAS GREAT

The 2005 ASA Okinawa Reunion is over and by all reports it was an excellent reunion. The Radisson Hotel in Branson served as the host hotel and did an excellent job. Even though the "actual" reunion dates were September 15-18, many folks came early and participated in some pre-reunion activities. The event was attended by 60 association members and 52 guests. The attendance is below the normal, but considering the hurricanes and high cost of transportation, we have to call it a success.

The reunion related activities began Wednesday (the 14th) around noon when the "early-bird" registration began. At 4:00 PM the troops began gathering

in the hotel lobby for a trip to Dolly Parton's Dixie Stampede. Forty hale and hearty folks trooped to the show place and after a quick group picture and some individual photos, seats were taken in the pre-show area where entertainment was provided by Charlie Brown, who did some rope tricks and juggling. At last it was time for the main event, and we all moved into the arena for the big show and dinner. The meal served without silverware allowed us to eat the old fashioned way, with our fingers. The food was actually quite good. Our group was seated on the Southern side of the arena, even though some loyalties are questionable. The show

was an excellent display of horsemanship (and woman-ship).

Thursday began with a gentle mist falling, but that failed to dampen the spirits of the 48 people who rode the Branson Railroad. This was a 40 mile excursion thru the beautiful Ozark foothills, complete with a narrated history of the area. Following the train ride, about half of the folks stayed in the historic Branson area for shopping and lunch. The other half returned to the hotel for lunch and to see who had arrived since they left.

Later in the afternoon another group (including some of the same from this morning) left for the Shoji

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Tabuchi Show, the rest of the group relaxed in the hospitality room or in the hotel lobby. As the day progressed and on into the weekend, we became outnumbered by a boisterous group of "Red Hat Ladies" in their red hats and purple dresses; but that is another story seen elsewhere in this issue. The welcome reception was held at 1800 hrs and Association President Billy D Davenport welcomed the assembly and first time attendees were welcomed and introduced. The remainder of the evening was spent in the hospitality room or exploring Branson.

Friday, after a leisurely breakfast and coffee in the hospitality room, another group, this time 67 strong, was off for a luncheon cruise on the Branson Belle. By all accounts this was a great trip with an excellent lunch. Those members staying back relaxed in the hospitality room or explored Branson on their own.

Later in the evening, for some reason, the member's only roll call never materialized; too many women came to see what went on at a "stag bar". Remember ladies, next year the mandatory roll call – at whatever time it is set for - is for men only (as old fashioned as that is). Friday's dinner buffet was good, but admittedly a little crowded. We'll do better in Harrisburg – promise.

Saturday was the "ducks" ride. These old amphibious WWII vehicles that travel on land and sea provided a quick tour of Branson plus a jaunt on the lake just to prove the vehicle will float. It was a great ride.

The business meeting was held at 1:00 PM. Vice President/President Elect Jim Norrbom was reaffirmed as incoming President. Lonnie Frampton was elected as Vice President/President Elect and Gary Duenow was elected as recording secretary. Tom Sturgeon and Paul Watson remained in their respective positions of treasurer and membership chairman. Tucson, AZ was selected as the 2007 reunion site. In other business items, it was decided to keep all future widows on the mailing list and send

them a complimentary copy of the newsletter and reunion registration material. A couple of minor changes in the constitution and by-laws were approved and implemented. As many of our members know, our own Sam Noto of Baton Rouge, LA is deeply involved with the resettling activities of Hurricane Katrina victims who were evacuated to Baton Rouge. Bill Overholt called our attention to the fact that over \$400.00 of the Plaque Fund remained and recommended that the full amount be given to Sam to assist in the relief efforts. The suggestion was unanimously approved, and before the meeting was finished, over \$1,600.00 had been raised and given to Sam for use in the resettling process. Sam noted that 100% of the funds would be used in relief assistance – not one penny for salaries, etc.

Following the meeting, the annual raffle was held. Most of the attendees brought gifts from their hometown or state. Raffle tickets were sold and the prizes distributed to the winners.

The Saturday night activities began at 6:30 PM with a photo session and cocktail hour. During the social hour everyone seemed to realize the reunion was drawing to a close, so that portion of the evening was spent, each person getting to know everyone else. The 90 minutes slipped away quickly and before you knew it, the call to order was sounded. The banquet began with the National Anthem, the Pledge of Allegiance, and the invocation. President Billy Davenport welcomed everyone, offered a toast, and dinner was served.

Following dinner, President Davenport gave his closing remarks as President by addressing the ladies present and reminding them of the hard – though still secret work – their husbands were involved in. "Worked hard - Played hard," seemed to be his theme. In closing, he stated how proud he was to have been president for the past two years, and how he looked forward to each and every reunion.

After Billy D's remarks, the formal change of command ceremony took place. Billy removed the 3rd ASA FS

Guideon from the flag base, passed it to Immediate Past President Larry Eckard who presented the guideon to incoming President Jim Norrbom, signifying the official change of leadership. President Norrbom replaced the guideon in the stand and formally took the reins as President.

In his introductory remarks, Jim noted that he was pleased to serve as Association President, thanked Billy and all past presidents for their work and assured everyone that he would carry on their traditions supplemented with his own ideas and recommendations. At the conclusion of Jim's remarks, the formalities ended, but the crowd lingered for a final beverage and story.

The farewell breakfast and memorial service was conducted on Sunday morning by newly appointed Chaplain Ross Lee. Ross did a bang-up job with the service remembering our deceased comrades. At one point in the service – when "America the Beautiful" was to be sung – in a somewhat plaintive voice, Ross announced that he was not a preacher, but he was closer to being a preacher than a singer and asked someone else to lead the song. They did, and Ross was off the hook. As usual, following the service, there was a great reluctance to say goodbye and walk out of the dining room. But slowly, the handshakes, hugs, and tears began. Then the room was empty. It was over.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

It was just ten short years ago, October of 1995, and I had just installed a CD ROM drive on my computer. At the same time I purchased the CD phonebook for the entire country—just as a curiosity.

One of the first people that I looked for was Larry Gruber, who had been in my TA unit in Operations. I found Larry living in Tampa, Florida. I called him and he told me of the impending reunion in Orlando, Florida.

That reunion was put together by Jim Bowling from Miami, Florida, who had noticed the lack of reunion activity for the unit in the *American Legion Magazine*.

That reunion was attended by about thirty Sobe vets and their wives.

I was fascinated with the idea of a reunion of those who served at Sobe Camp and set about locating

as many as possible.

At first I thought this could be done by “networking”—by locating someone and that someone locating others that they knew on Okinawa. The reunion roster would then grow geometrically. This did not happen because forty-five years had clouded most people’s memory.

As luck would have it, I had contacted a Sobe vet whose name I remembered, Darwin Sell of Allentown, PA, while passing through that area in 1994.

I contacted him again in late 1995 about the reunion activity. He told me of some others whose names he remembered.

One of those he remembered was Ralph Bolinder of Brockton, Massachusetts. I located Ralph now living in Live Oak, FL. It was Ralph Bolinder who provided the key to the success of our reunions in 1997 and 1999.

Ralph had saved all the orders pertaining to him while in the Army from 1954 to 1957. Ralph made copies of these orders and sent them to me. From these orders I was able to establish a list of over 300 complete names and service numbers. Then the task began in earnest!

As I contacted people on the list, I found that they too had saved orders and more names were added. Now there was something that I have called “Tour Creep,” as orders began appearing from dates either side of the original 1954 to 1957 window.

More and more names of those with different tour dates were added to the list until now, it contains almost 3000 complete names and service numbers.

Even with that large number of confirmed names and service numbers, the list is not complete. There are more orders out there as indicated by the “holes” in the sequence. The list begins in 1950 and ends in 1960. (This end date was set by me as the task of finding people became overwhelming and the “younger” guys who served after 1960 were either still working or not

interested in attending a reunion at this time. I welcome the prospect of a “Volunteer” taking on the task from 1960 onward.)

Of this list of names, almost 1100 living members of the ASA Okinawa group have been located. Unfortunately, there are almost 400 that also have been confirmed as deceased.

The list starts with the 111th Signal Service Company and includes the 327th Communications Reconnaissance Company, the 8603rd Administration Area Unit, the 8603rd Detached Unit, and finally ends with the 3rd US ASA Field Station—all designations for the ASA unit on Okinawa during this time.

The job is not done! I NEED HELP! There are over 1000 ASA Okinawa veterans still missing. Perhaps you can locate some of them. If you have come across orders or address books, all of which would contain valuable information which would aid in the search, they would be welcomed.

If anyone is interested in using their investigative skills, I would be happy to provide a list of those still “unaccounted for.” For those with e-mail and internet access, I will be happy to set you up with the Missing list as well as tips on how to locate people. I cannot begin to tell you just how rewarding it is to locate another ASA Okinawa veteran....it’s like collecting baseball cards and finding that rare one!

COME TO HARRISBURG, PA IN 2006

In order to let you have input in what you would like at your reunion, a preview of some of the attractions in the Harrisburg area will be described and you will then be asked to choose which ones you would like to see on the agenda of your reunion. Read the descriptions and then fill out the survey and return it to Military Locator & Reunion Service. We will use your choices to make up the reunion packages. Here are some things you might like to know about the Harrisburg area:

ABOUT HARRISBURG

Named for John Harris, who operated a ferry at the present site. His son, John Jr., laid out the town in 1785 and gave the land to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Harrisburg is located on the Susquehanna River, which played an important part in its selection as the capital of Pennsylvania in 1812. Its location also played a large part in the early development of the Pennsylvania canal system and the subsequent development of the railroads, highways and airlines. Today, Harrisburg is one of the most important commercial centers and distribution points in the East.

ATTRACTIONS IN AREA

HARRISBURG STATE CAPITOL BUILDING:

The statehouse is an Italian Renaissance-style structure and is an outstanding example of architecture. It contains collections of art and sculpture, including large murals. On the floor of the main hallway, tiles show Pennsylvania's history and symbols. At the dedication in 1906, President Teddy Roosevelt described this structure as "the handsomest building I ever saw." The dome of the capitol rises 272 feet and weighs 52 million pounds. It was modeled after St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, and its

beautiful staircase looks like the one from the Paris Opera.

NATIONAL CIVIL WAR MUSEUM:

The only museum in the United States that attempts to portray the story of the Nation's Civil War. Equally balanced presentations will be humanistic in nature without bias to Union or Confederate causes.

MIDDLETOWN & HUMMELSTOWN RAILROAD:

Board 1920 vintage passenger coaches at the 1891 Middletown Station and Gift Shop for an hour and a quarter, 11-mile round trip ride through the scenic Swatara Creek Valley. Hear live narration of history and folklore of the area.

GETTYSBURG:

Revisit the scene of the famous Battle of Gettysburg and the site of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. There are over 1,000 monuments and cannon along over 40 miles of scenic roads. Also see the scene of Picket's Charge, General Robert E. Lee's Headquarters, Little Round Top, and the Devil's Den. Visit the shrine to the Union and Confederate soldiers who fought here.

LANCASTER COUNTY:

The scenic, rolling farmlands of Lancaster County and peaceful countryside where the Amish still live without electricity will take you back in time. See the Amish countryside dotted with huge farm houses and barns. Roll past the horse-pulled black buggies still used by the Amish people. The Pennsylvania Dutch Country welcomes visitors with incredible food and world renowned crafts.

In the past, ML&RS has been able to arrange a bountiful lunch and a tour of a real Amish home. This is always a favorite treat of any visit to Lancaster County.

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HERSHEY:

Visit the Hershey Chocolate Visitor's Center. Take a fascinating tour ride that will teach you how chocolate is made. It ends with a free sample!

Hershey Gardens is a spectacular 23-acre botanical garden featuring a 3 1/2 acre award-winning rose garden, an outstanding display of annual flowering color and an outdoor Butterfly House with over 400 butterflies.

HARLEY DAVIDSON PLANT TOUR:

Located in York, PA, this plant will give you a close look at what it takes to make the legend roll on. After a short film, you will begin a tour of the manufacturing and assembly of Dyna, Softa motorcycles.

STURGIS PRETZEL HOUSE:

Visit the first commercial pretzel bakery in America. Legend says that in 1850, Julius Sturgis was given the pretzel recipe by a hobo as a token of appreciation for being invited to dine with the Sturgis family one evening. Sturgis was already baking bread for a business and added pretzels after having been given the recipe. Soon he dropped the bread business and started baking pretzels exclusively. Now owned by Clyde and Barbara Ann Tshudy, it is a state-of-the-art bakery, turning out 245 pretzels in a minute or five tons of hard pretzels a day.
